Index, 5 min. interview - Cheryl **NSW Seniors Week Just another Market Sunday** 5 to 11 A meander through the markets This year presents challenges for PBNC, especially in keeping up momentum that has been built over many years of dedicated work. But, as Drift's cover suggests, "The Show Must Go On", and so it shall.

However, one big challenge for us is to cover a large shortfall in our operating budget, brought about by the cessation of PBNC's Community Investment Program (CIP) funding from the C'th Dept of Social Services (DSS) which ended on February 27, 2015. The CIP wound up as part of DSS funding reforms, and, sadly for PBNC, this signalled the end to our core funding. Also, unfortunately for us (and PBNC's children and parenting support capacity), our DSS funding application to provide such activities was unsuccessful. PBNC's lack of success in this latest funding round (under 'New Ways of Working with DSS') is echoed in other local, not-for-profit organisations. The net effect is

that slashing funds in this manner will have a seriously detrimental effect on services in place for people experiencing disadvantage within our region.

PBNC's CIP funding has been crucial in our ability to plan, develop, implement and evaluate innovative, community-driven activities for widespread community benefit. The key to continuing to provide appropriate and adequate community-strengthening activities will be in attracting substitute funding and/or increasing income from our social enterprises. Both options will be difficult to achieve. Nevertheless, PBNC will do everything in its power to keep rolling along positively.

We are so fortunate to have such a wealth of contributors volunteers, staff and community - to assist us reach our goals. Thank you!

The tutors are specially trained, experienced educators at Pottsville Beach Neighbourhood Centre's Technology Centre in Elizabeth St. Pottsville.

NSW Seniors Week is the largest festival for seniors in the Southern Hemisphere. During the week, government, community and commercial organisations hold hundreds of events across the state, encompassing art, sport, music, entertainment, technology, recreation, health, good nutrition and more. The events cater to people over 60, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders over 50, and those over 50 who have a lifelong disability.

2015 NSW Seniors Week is presented by the Department of Family and Community Services (FACS).

"Just another Market Sunday..."

Much 'behind the scenes' work takes place before, during and after market days to ensure the smooth running of PBNC's Pottsville Beach Markets. All new stall holder enquiries are handled by coordinator Lee Robertson, who determines if the markets need what the stall holder is offering. There are council rules set down for market stall products and PBNC must abide by them. Each stall holder has to fit strict criteria determined by Lee and PBNC's Market Committee, with priority given to local producers. The centre has a set of guidelines and rules of participation for market stall holders and a copy is given to all new stall holders. Market information can be found on the centre's website

There are two types of stall holders - casual and permanent. Casual stall holders need to ring and confirm a site any time onwards from the Monday after each Sunday market. Permanent holders have sites aside for every market day and if they don't attend (without notice) they have to pay a fee. The guidelines and rules for participation for Pottsville Beach market participation state that non-attendance fees apply to any stallholder, permanent or casual, who does not give prior notice of nonattendance. All permanent stall holders are automatically given a site at each market unless they advise otherwise. Casual stall holders must contact the PBNC Administration office to confirm a site at any market. Due to the site's size, PBNC has restrictions on the number and placement of market sites. Once all sites are filled, a waiting list is created. Each stall holder pays a modest stall fee which differs depending on whether the stall holder has their own Public Liability Insurance.

Volunteers put up and take down market signs at certain locations before and after each market. At each market there are at least six regular volunteers and two people from a local community group who assist the market coordinator on the day. On each market day, the coordinator and volunteers arrive on site at 6am to set up their on-site office tent and begin to meet and greet stall holders, accept stall fees and direct the stall holders to their allocated sites, and deal with the many inquiries directed to them during the day. PBNC's Opp Shop and Secondhand Furniture/Trash and Treasure stalls are always open and a sausage sizzle is cooked by volunteers. At the end of each market day, PBNC's market cleaner ensures that the site is cleared for the next use.

"The markets are always a busy, eventful and informative experience for PBNC's wonderful market volunteers and me," said coordinator Lee. "Events include locals dropping by our onsite office for a chat; market patrons providing us with positive feedback regarding their market experience; assisting families to track down a misplaced child; plus numerous general inquiries about sites, stall holders, and so on."

"Our 'Welcome to Pottsville' kits are very popular and require replenishing after each market," continued Lee. "Lost or claimed property includes keys, purses and wallets, which we often successfully re-unite with their relieved owners. Then there is the odd ambulance called for un-well patrons - luckily only three have been needed over the past 12 years. At each market we allow for a certain number of community stalls such as SES, Friends of the Pound, Tweed Valley Relay for Life, Uniting Church, Tweed River War Widows, Lions Club Cabarita/Pottsville, and YMCA." PBNC also has very generous community partnership schemes which ensure market donations (money and in-kind value) are distributed to other local not-for-profit organisations and groups.

Among other factors, the success of each market depends on weather, school holidays (NSW and QLD) and the number of stalls. PBNC has held a council licence for the Pottsville Beach Markets for the past 12 years. Each term lasts three years – then the markets are up for

tender again and PBNC has to re-apply, which the centre will be doing this year ■

Following my recent student placement at PBNC, and having completed my TAFE certificate, I asked Angela if I could stay on as a volunteer. I was invited to be a part of the Drift production team and to attend the next meeting. The meeting was held during the school holidays so my sevenyear-old son Byron was present, quietly playing his gaming device next to me. Byron, being a bright and inquisitive child, soon became more involved in the meeting than the game he was playing. He began chiming in with questions like "what are quotes please, Angela?" or "what is funding?" Finally Byron said to everyone at the table that his favourite part about the markets is going up to the neighbourhood centre and getting a sausage from the sausage sizzle because they are cheap and really yum. "I like barbeque sauce and onion too," he added. Well that was it; the Drift team members

The first task for Byron and me was to promote the Pottsville Markets. For twelve years, PBNC, through the Market Sub-committee and Coordinator Lee have led a dedicated group of volunteers to keep the markets running smoothly. The markets are an important source of funding for PBNC, allowing them to continue providing support, activities, facilities and programs for community benefit.

Since moving to Pottsville, Byron and I have attended the markets twice a month to do our shopping. We love the fresh local fruit and veggies; we buy seedlings for our garden, and sometimes clothing or accessories, and we have both had a good jump on the jumping castle, but most importantly, Byron gets his sausage sandwich from the PBNC sausage sizzle!

Byron and I began our Drift assignment at the markets on Sunday, February 1, with a visit to Giselle Somerville's stall. Giselle makes and sells homemade jams, pickles, chutneys and relish. She says the Pottsville market is the only one she attends and she appreciates the fact that she gets a permanent site with reasonable rates. "It's very friendly and overall a better market than others," she continued, adding that she regularly finds amazing gifts for her grandkids at the markets. Giselle really likes the local fruit and veg stalls and says that all the stall holders support each other.









We move on to Peter Thompson's stall, where he sells clothing, jewellery and accessories. Peter says he has been attending the Pottsville Market long before PBNC took over management and has greatly relied on the market to make his living. He says Pottsville is the best market he has ever attended and he always attends twice a month because it is very close to home; the parking is very easy; the rates are very affordable; the grounds are flat and maintained well and the management and volunteers do an amazing job running the market. Peter mentioned volunteer Dane, saying that Dane does a fantastic job, is always friendly and ready for a chat.

Next we come across The National Party stall, and see Matthew Fraser, President of Tweed Business Chamber, handing out balloons with his wife, Paula. Matthew says he enjoys a Byron Beans coffee, a cookie from *Love A Cookie* or some fudge from *Mum's Fudge*. His favourite stalls are those where you see creativity and passion, such as where someone has handcrafted something themselves or created delicious, homemade foods, taking a great idea right through to packaging and marketing. He feels that the Pottsville market really stands out because of the atmosphere, the incredible location and the friendly people.

Next, Byron and I chat with Geoff Provest - State Member for Tweed for a few minutes. Geoff is enjoying the morning sunshine with his partner Niki, chatting with

local market goers. He says he has always been a supporter of the Pottsville Markets and enjoys attending whenever he can. He believes the markets are important for Pottsville as they give the opportunity for people to interact as a community and provide a fantastic platform for artistic members of the





community to showcase their handmade creations. The market helps to boost the local economy, he says, with many tourists enjoying the markets while on holiday. This creates local jobs and provides a significant income stream for some community members, making it "a great way for locals to support locals". Geoff really loves the fresh local herbs, and appreciates handmade creations, such as

the incredible-looking wooden chopping boards he had seen today, while his partner Niki said she really loved watching the candle making.

After chatting with several other stall holders and market goers, I find I now have a hungry little boy. So we head up to the grounds of PBNC. At the neighbourhood centre, we meander through the trash and treasure area and the Opp Shop, where many others are also casually browsing to see what special treasures they might find. I almost always get a gorgeous treasure for a bargain price here. Byron takes his \$2.50 pocket money and makes a beeline for the sausage sizzle. As always, he asks for a sausage in bread with barbeque sauce and onion because "this is so,





so yum and my favourite," he says. We sit down under the shade at a nearby picnic table to relax while Byron devours his well-earned brunch.

As we stroll back toward the market ground, laughter is coming from a nearby stall and I find Ken Hardy and his friends and family sitting around a beautiful, hand-crafted table. They are sharing a laugh and also enjoying the shade. Ken explains that he has had a stall here since before PBNC began managing the markets and so far, everything has been fantastic. "It's an easy market because it's home base for us, everyone is friendly and the market is managed really well. I don't think any other market compares to Pottsville as it is the best, friendliest and most lovely location," said Ken. I am about to eat when I see a friend and her kids bouncing along towards me. We eat together at the samosa stall and spend a few minutes catching up. This is another reason why I love coming here myself - I get to connect with people I know.

We are the Pottsville Beach Community Centre Tech Centre Team (just call us PBNCTC).

You are always welcome to pop in for a chat with one of our friendly tutors, or contact us regarding any technology issues you may be having.

This is our team - all volunteers - Diana, Garry, Linda, Dave N, Chris M, Anne, Pauline, Marilyn, Morgan, Sheri, Brenda, Mauveen, Helen, Julie A, Danny (coordinator).

These are the people who make it all happen, along with joint coordinator Drew Stevenson, who has kept this thing alive for a long time pretty much on his own.

What we do

We provide one on one tuition at \$5 per hour; repair and upgrade services for all consumer technology items whether it be a laptop, a desktop, a smartphone, a tablet (Android, Microsoft or Apple) or even a smart TV; and facilitate people's use of the computers, printers and scanners available at the Tech Centre.

Why we do it

We are part of Pottsville Beach Neighbourhood Centre, a non-profit organisation that aims to build a stronger, safer, more connected community.

Our core values

Pottsville Beach Neighbourhood Centre Inc. (PBNC) is a not-for-profit community based organisation. In partnership with the Tweed Coast community and others, we provide services and support based on identified need to improve the quality of life of the community. Apps of the month

These are some of my favourite apps for smartphones and tablets.



Android Assistant

If you use an android phone or tablet check this one out. I use it daily.

It has heaps of tools and useful functions but when you start it there is one option called "Quick boost" which you should use daily. It will free up memory and significantly speed up your device.



<u>Photo Synth</u>

I did a bit of a double-take on seeing Microsoft's name attached to this, not least given the lack of a price-tag. But PhotoSynth is a really great panorama app; it's user-friendly and fun to use, especially when watching your panoramas take shape while you capture them. (The iOS Camera app also has a panorama mode, but Photosynth's more flexible and works with older devices.)



<u>Transfer my Data</u>

If you are new to Windows Phone and are coming from (almost) any other phone, this app is a must. It'll copy all of your contacts from your old phone to your new one in no time. Transfer my Data is a quick and easy way of copying contacts from almost any phone (Symbian, Android, iOS, BlackBerry, Windows Phone and others) to your new Windows Phone using Bluetooth. Some phones may also be capable of transferring text messages and pictures, including many Lumia phones. Transfer my Data copies all your contacts into the Windows Phone People Hub, from where it's easy to call, mail, chat or follow friends on your favourite social network. On supported phones, contacts and messages can also be transferred to and from an SD card.

Tip of the month

What is the difference between the left-click and the right-click?

The basic difference is that the left-click carries out some specific action while the rightclick presents a menu of possibilities for action. The left-click action is predefined whereas the right-click provides choices. The table below makes this clearer.

Table I. Explanation of various mouse actions within Windows				
Mouse button	Action	Function		
Left	Single-click	Selects something, usually a file, as a target for some action to come next. On some systems, the setting is changed to make the single-click the same as on the Internet.		
Left	Double-click	Causes an action to be carried out, such as opening a file. Note: The Internet is different. For example, clicking once on a link in a browser is sufficient to open the link.		
Right	Single-click	Brings up a list of possible actions for an object. Any actions on the list must be clicked again (right or left) before they actually occur.		
Right	Double-click	Has no separate meaning		

Right-click drag-and-drop

One of my favourite examples of the difference between the right and left-click is the common operation for moving or copying objects where the mouse is used to drag the object from one place and then drop it in a new location.

Copy here	Most people use the left-click for this operation but the right- click can also be used for drag-and-drop and is more versatile.
Move here	
Create shortcuts here	When you drag and drop a file with the left-click, the result varies. A shortcut may be created or the file may be copied
C	or it may be moved. It depends on the circumstances. That is

Cancel fine, if you remember which action takes place when. Instead, I prefer to use the right-click to drag and drop. In this case you first get a context menu like the one shown above left. This allows you to choose the operation that you had in mind.

The Context or Shortcut menu

The choices available in a right-click action are presented in a window called a context menu. It is also sometimes called a shortcut menu. The terms are interchangeable but I prefer the name "context menu".

A place to play

Pottsville Beach Neighbourhood Centre (PBNC) invites parents and carers of pre-school age children to participate in the centre's PlayTime Group (PTG). The group is for babies and young children from birth to 6 years old, with parents and carers participating and being involved in their child's experience of the world. It is a place for children to play, grow, make friends and have fun and also a place for parents and carers to network and socialise.

PlayTime Group is held in PBNC's Sandbar Room, a spacious activity room with an outdoor, shaded playground. Daily sessions are generally based on free play, where parents and carers set up various 'play stations' using PTG's extensive selection of toys and equipment such as dress-ups, cars, farm sets and computer/office equipment inside; and cars, street signs, cubby house or gym mats outside.

Interested families are welcome to visit PlayTime Group twice as visitors to see if they wish to become members. There is a minimal fee of \$3 per family per session and an annual membership fee of \$20 per family, which helps cover the cost associated with running the group.

PlayTime Group is a community led initiative run jointly by PBNC and PlayTime Group parents and carers. PBNC provides administrative support and PTG members lead all activities.

There are two sessions a week during school terms, one on Monday and one on Thursday from 9.30am till 11.30am.

A student, recently on placement with PBNC and now a contributor to *Drift*, Emma Peel also volunteers at Cabarita Youth Service (CYS), which has just obtained a temporary home at 29 Tweed Coast Road, Bogangar. Emma recently conducted an interview with CYS youth worker Chris Hitchcock, and the following article is based on this interview.

Cabarita Youth Service is a not-for-profit, community-based organisation providing activities and support to local youth. It offers diverse, meaningful activities and excursions to boys and girls of various ages. CYS's recent, massive school holiday program was extensively supported by community members, with activities including boxing with Nick; barista training with Café Mod; the Creative Cave with Cara; girls-only gym classes; and girls-only days with activities like nail painting, beauty therapy, hair, makeup and massage. Excursions included Flip Out Tweed; Ballina water slide; water sports days at the creek; barbeque and sports at Norries Headland and skate park safaris.

The centre is open every day during the school holidays for kids to come in and enjoy the Xbox, Playstation3 and assorted games; or chill out on the couches, play some ping pong, watch a surf movie, read some magazines, play a musical instrument, play a board game or listen to music on the stereo, with all these items generously donated by local community members and businesses.

CYS has a management committee, a youth worker, TAFE students and other volunteers who all contribute to the running of the service. All committee members, staff and volunteers must have a Working with Children clearance.

The youth service has been active for approximately five years, and was formed as a result of the community identifying issues occurring increasingly within the youth of the community, such as vandalism, wilful damage, anti-social behaviour, theft and graffiti, said Chris. CYS was created to provide activities to help curb these behaviours, and provide a referral point to other services if needed.

Chris spoke of the challenge for the youth centre to get continuous funding. "Our best source of funding is our main benefactor and supporter, Cabarita Beach Bowls &_Sports Club, which has for years been a huge supporter of our service and what we are trying to achieve by giving us ongoing support, such as community grants," Chris said.

Other sources of funding include fundraising activities and the overwhelming support from the community, some giving generous donations with the clear message of the need for a youth service. Because of all this, CYS now has temporary premises to trial a youth centre.

Chris reported that the utilisation of the Youth Centre and its holiday programs had been astronomical and the level of participation amazing, strongly confirming the need for this service in Cabarita, and **all without government funding.** "My favourite thing is simply to have this opportunity to be here and to be involved in such a great community in such a special way. I feel really blessed to be part of it and to be able to provide a service that is so meaningful and has already shown that it can make a huge difference, firstly to our youth but also to the **Cabarita community and surrounds as a whole," said** Chris.

Many young people come to the centre not knowing anyone, Chris said. "They arrive here shy and within half an hour they are feeling accepted and beaming - they have made new friends. They express that they are now looking forward to going to school and catching up with friends they have made here and quite often at the end of the day, they don't want to leave the centre."

Chris said he would love CYS to be able to secure the premises for the long term, ensuring sufficient hours for a dedicated youth worker and a budget that allows the centre to offer meaningful and heavily subsidised activities.

"I feel it is important to have these subsidised activities so we can keep everything either free or low cost to provide these activities to families that really need it, so that everyone has access to the service," Chris concluded.

Jim

Jim began volunteering at the centre in 2011 and has become a well-known **figure at PBNC's Trash and Treasure** stalls, including the very popular book stall. He works on Thursdays, Fridays and Market Sundays.

A fitter and welder by trade, Jim worked in the lift industry with another PBNC worker and good friend, Russel, in the seventies. Tragically, in 1974, Jim's car was hit by a drunken driver near Ocean Shores. Jim was in a coma for 10 days and his friend and passenger died as a result of her injuries. Now in his sixties, he has been unable to work in a professional capacity since the accident, but has kept himself busy and has slowly improved his brain functioning to the point where he has been told it is now equal to that of a younger man.

Working at the centre has been very beneficial for him, said Jim. "It's a good place, a good team and they're all good blokes," he commented. He said PBNC was a place where he feels he can help people. Jim has found it has been great for him to mix with so many people all the time, especially at the markets, where the trash and treasure, book stall, sausage sizzle and opp shop attract many market goers to the grounds of PBNC. Jim said he enjoyed talking to many people from diverse backgrounds and he looked forward to his work days at the centre.

Away from the centre, he enjoys fishing and going on holidays. Jim is holidaying with his wife, Carol, in Thailand soon, where they will be visiting his son who works for a diving company in Kosa Mui.

Something that upsets Jim is when people dump furniture and other household items in PBNC grounds. Many of the items get wet and become useless, while others, such as huge tables and lounge suites, are hard to lift, he said.



If you have suitable items you wish to donate, please bring them to PBNC between 9am and 1pm on a Thursday or Friday morning (when there are workers here to move the items); or ring PBNC's Front Desk team who will arrange for our pickup team to come, assess them and bring them to PBNC if they are in saleable order or can be renovated or repaired by the Men's Shed/Second hand Furniture team.

Following these procedures ensures that your donated items will form a very important part of PBNC's income source and go towards making our community stronger. And you'll be making Jim a happy man!

Supporting refugees: new group to launch in Pottsville

The suffering of asylum seekers, particularly children, in detention has inspired several Pottsville residents to form a group offering friendship and support to asylum seekers and refugees.

The Pottsville Refugee Support Group (PRSG) will hold an introductory public meeting and community awareness-raising event on Sunday, March 15, 3pm till 5pm, in the Reef Room (downstairs) at Pottsville Beach Neighbourhood Centre (PBNC), 10A-12B Elisabeth St, Pottsville.

The Pottsville Refugee Support Group (PRSG) began as a steering committee in July 2014. They were motivated to begin their own group after attending a fundraising documentary film shown by the Uki Refugee Project, at the Regent Cinema in Murwillumbah in July 2014.

The group has developed a partnership arrangement with PBNC to help raise community awareness of refugee issues. The partnership will also facilitate fundraising efforts to support refugees with their basic needs, and assist PRSG to organise friendship visits for refugees to Pottsville and the Tweed Coast.

At the March launch, an information session will be presented by Ms Rebecca Lim, Community Engagement Coordinator at the Romero Centre in Brisbane. Rebecca's commitment to refugees was recognised by the United Nations Association for Australia in 2014, which presented her with an award for her contribution and dedication to raising awareness and promoting human rights for asylum seekers in Australia and overseas.

There will be a short DVD, produced by five young people from refugee backgrounds who have settled in Brisbane. Their stories speak about the brutality and futility of war, exile, new beginnings, and the way access to education affects the human spirit. Rebecca will also explain the work of the Romero Centre - a refugee and asylum seeker support service - and answer questions about refugee policies, her work as a Migration Officer and her visits to the detention centre on Manus Island. Rebecca will be accompanied by some of the refugees who access the services at the Romero Centre, and they will participate in discussions with members of the Pottsville community. Light refreshments will follow the presentation.

The PBNC-based 5:2 ship set sail from PBNC in February and its passengers are on the way to a slimmer, healthier self! Visit http:// thefastdiet.co.uk/ for some background on this healthy lifestyle concept, made famous by Dr Michael Mosely, a journalist and medic from the UK. Michael says, "The 5:2 is not a prescriptive diet. Everyone has to find their own way to stick to it. That could mean two fast days in a row, or more intensely fasting 3:4 some weeks. Some people like to eat a boiled egg in the morning'' - sans soldiers, of course - "others go through the day on black coffee and lots of water until early evening when they spend all their calories on one meal. Experiment till you find what works for you."

For PBNC's maiden voyage on the good ship SS 5:2, members fast two days a week (light eating up to 500 calories for females and 600 calories for males) and eat normally (well – maybe a little healthier!) for the other five days. There are about 12 members on deck already, said PBNC admin worker and captain, Annette. Members support each other to eat more healthily, get through the fast days more easily, and share tips, meal plans and recipes.

I would like to further share information regarding the first Tweed Coast Enduro Triathlon on Sunday 29 March 2015.

The Tweed Coast Enduro is a long course, distance triathlon event (1.9km swim, 90km cycle and 21.1km run) that will complete the cornerstone of Tweed's multisport offering. The Enduro continues the fine tradition of delivering simple, enjoyable, well-executed events in wonderful locations.

Our 'Potty Dollar' program is being developed with the local shop owners to promote 'buy local', and thanks to Vicki from Inspire Health for all the door to door discussions.

Together with our supporting partners including Destination Tweed, Tweed Coast Holiday Parks, New South Wales Police, and Tweed Shire Council, we will work to deliver a valuable economic and socially responsible project with perennial gains to all stakeholders.

The Tweed Coast Enduro race model would not be viable without the inclusion of additional stakeholders such as the schools in Pottsville and Cabarita Beach Surf Life Saving Club, who will each contribute their expertise and labour, receiving proceeds in return for their assistance.
